

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



DIRECTIONS FOR SÉLF-MEASUREMENT.



FOR COAT.—From 1 to 2 and on to 3, for full length; from 4 to 5 for breadth of back, and 6 for elbow point, and on to 7 for length of sleeves; round the arm at 5, 6, 7, for width at sleeves; round the breast at 8, and waist at 2.

VEST.—From 1 over shoulder to vest length in front, with breast and waist measure as above.

TROUSERS.—Outside seam from A B and on to foot, also exact length of inside seam from C to foot; round the waist at \mathbb{A} , round the seat at D, leg at B, and also at foot.

These measurements, taken correctly with an inch tape, will insure a correct fit. The gentleman to mention if he wears his clothes tight or easy.

MEASUREMENT AND WEIGHT OF CATTLE.

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POST-OFFICE INFORMATION.

INLAND LETTER AND PARCEL POST.

To and from all parts of the United Kingdom, for prepaid letters :-

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It will thus be seen that a letter or parcel exceeding the weight of 12 ounces is liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce or fraction of an ounce, beginning with the first ounce.

No letter or parcel must exceed 18 inches in length, 9 inches in breadth, or 6 inches in depth.

A letter posted unpaid will be charged on delivery with double postage, and a letter posted insufficiently prepaid will be charged double the deficiency.

Concurrently with the reduction of postage on Inland Letters, the Inland Sample Post was abolished.

REGISTRATION.

By the prepayment of a fee of fourpence, any letter, newspaper, or book-packet may be registered to any place in the United Kingdomor the BritishColonies. The Post Office will not undertake the safe transmission of valuable enclosures in unregistered letters; and letters found to contain coin will, on delivery, be charged double fee. | inches in depth.

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INLAND BOOK-POST.

The Book-Post rate is One Halfpenny for every 2 ozs, or fraction of 2 ozs.

A Book-Packet may contain not only books, paper, or other substance in ordinary use for writing or printing, whether plain or written or printed upon to the exclusion of any written letter or communication of the nature of a letter), photographs, when not on glass or in frames containing glass or any like substance, and anything usually appertaining to such articles in the way of binding and mounting, or necessiry for their safe transmission by post, but also Circulars when these are wholly or in great part printed, engraved, or lithographed.

Every book-packet must be posted either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends, and in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examinationotherwise it will be treated as a letter.

Any Book-Packet which may be found to contain a letter or communication of the nature of a letter, not being a Circular-letter or not wholly printed, or any enclosure sealed or in any way closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not allowed by the regulations of the Book-Post, will be treated as a Letter, and charged with double the deficiency of the Letter postage.

A packet posted wholly unpaid will be charged with double the Book-Postage; and if posted partially pre-paid, with double the deficiency.

No Book-Packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or 1 foot 6 inches in length, 9 inches in width, and 6

POSTAGE ON INLAND NEWSPAPERS

A postage of one halfpenny is charged for the transmission of each newspaper, as defined by the Act. Such newspaper posted for inland circulation must be prepaid by adhesive stamp or stamped wrapper. The prepaid rate for a packet containing two or more registered newspapers is one halfpenny for each newspaper, or, if un-der 2 ounces, then at the book rate of one halfpenny for every 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz. No packet of newspapers must exceed 2 feet in length, or 1 foot in width ordepth, or 14lb. in weight.

POST CARDS.

The post cards, which bear a halfpenny impressed stamp, are only available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom. The front (or stamped) side is intended for the address only. On the reverse side any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed. Nothing may be attached ; if the card be folded, cut, or otherwise altered, it will be charged on delivery as an under-paid letter.

POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

By 24 Vic. cap. 14, deposits of one shilling, or of any number of shillings, or pounds and shillings, of will be received from any depositor at the Post-Office Savings Banks, provided the deposits made by such depositor in any year ending the 31st day of December do not exceed £30, and provided the total amount standing insuchdepositor's name in the books of the Postmaster-General do not exceed £150, exclusive of interest. When the principal and interest together, standing to the credit of any one depositor, amount to the sum of £200, all interest will cease, so long as the same funds continue to amount to the said sum of £200.

The interest is calculated to the 31st December in every year, and is then added to, and becomes part of the principal.

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REGISTERED FISHING BOATS.

Owners and Masters of fishing boats must comply with the following rules :-

1. Every boat used as a Fishing Boat for purposes of Sale must be registered, lettered, and numbered, as required by the Sea Fisheries Regulations.

2. The master of every registered Sea Fishing Boat must have on board his boat at all times (unless specially exempted by the Board of Trade) the Cer-tificate of Registry. 3. If the Certificate is lost, immediate

application must be made for another.

4. The Certificate must be presented to the Fishery Officera. Once in every year for examination and endorsement :

b. On a change of master, for the same to be noted thereon.

5. Ou a change of ownership, or on re-moval to another Collectorship, of any Registered Boat, a fresh Certificate of Registry must be applied for, and the former Certificate given up to be cancelled.

Non-compliance with either of these regulations render the Owner and the Master liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds, besides the seizure and detention of the boat.

EAST COAST LIGHTS.

SUNDERLAND, N. Fier head. Two fixed lights; upper White, visible 13 miles; lower Red, vis. 6. If the wind is westerly, S. Fier light is put out at high water. The Green light under is a signal denoting danger in the harbour, will be exhibited from the new lighthouse, seen over an arc of 144 deg. When the tide light is not shown, no vessel should attempt entering the harbour, as it is very dangerous. S. Pier Head. Fixed White light, visible 10 miles.

Sourze Point, on Point. White electric light, fixed, and flashes every halfminute, visible 20 miles; also a fixed light, White and Red sectors. The fixed light in Souter Point tower also electric, 21 ft. below the flashing light, and shows White between bearings N. by W. and N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and Red between N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and N. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. A powerful fog horn is sounded in thick or foggy weather from Souter Point lighthouse. The horn is seaward of the lighthouse, and blasts are emitted it intervals of 45 seconds, and equally distributed through an arc of 180 deg., viz., from N. 4 E. round easterly to S.4W.

TYNEMOUTH, in Castle Yard. Red light revolving every minute, visible 18 miles. Three vertical fixed lights, Green at top, White in centre, and Red at bottom, at North Pier Works. Fixed Red light on middle of North Pier.

TIME, or North Shields. Two fixed White lights, bearing from each other, E. by S. and W. by N., visible 16 and 13 miles.

Coqurr, S.W. part of Island, Two fixed lights, in one tower. High light White, with a Red sector, vis. 14 miles; low light, White and Red sectors, 28 ft. below the other. The former shows White from seaward between bearings S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.; and Red from S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. into the land to cover Bulmer Bush and Bulmer Stile Rocks. A dim light is seen round remainder of the circle. The low light is White between bearings of N.W. and N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and Red from N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. to N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. over Bondicar Bush Shoal. When the upper light is lost sight of, the line of Hausley Point and Bondicar Bush will be passed, and while in the Red light great caution is necessary in approaching the shore.

ing the shore. WARKWORTH, N. end of S. Pier. Fixed Red light, visible 1 mile.

FARN ISLANDS, Farn. Two lights, higher near S.W. point of island, lower near N.W. point, bearings N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. easterly, 187 yards. High revolving every half-minute, Low fixed; the former visible 15 miles, the latter 12. Low light is visible between bearings of SS.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and S. by E., but not from southward. A powerful fog trampet will be sounded in thick or foggy weather.

BERWICK PIER HEAD. Two fixed lights in same tower, visible 12 and 8 miles. High light White, Low Red. Berwick Pier light is not visible unless vessel be eastward of the Seal Carr ledges.

LONGSTONE, on the western side of the islet, one White light, revolving every half-minute, visible 15 miles. Dangers extend more than three-quarters of a mile to the N.E. of lighthouse. A powerful fog trumpet will be sounded in thick or foggy weather.

EVENOUTH. Two fixed leading lights, upper Red, on corner of a honse; lower White on W. Pier head; visible 10 and 8 miles.

ST. ABBS', on Head, White light, flashing every 10 seconds, visible 20 miles.

DUNBAR, Old Harbour. Fixed light, visible 5 miles. White in direction of entrance, Blue to Westward, Red to enstward. Victoria Harbour - Fixed White light.

FIRTH OF FORTH, Isle of May, on the summit of the Isle, N.E. side. Two fixed lights, visible 21 and 15 miles. When in one they lead about half-a-mile to the E. of the North Carr Rock. The Lights must on no account be opened to the W.

BELL ROCK, near N. end of reef. One light, revolving every minute, visible 15 miles. White and Red alternately. The base of the lighthouse is covered about 10 feet at high water. In foggy weather a bell is sounded every half-minute.

ST. ANDREW'S. Two fixed lights—one on Pier head, Red; the other White, on Turret in Cathedral wall. The former visible 6, and the latter 5 miles.

BUDDONNESS, or Tay, on the Ness. Two fixed White lights, visible 15 and 12 miles, bearing N.W. by N. and S.E. by S. 401 yards. Leading lights towards the mouth of Tay river.

DUNDER HARBOUR, Middle and Eastern Piers (2), bearing N.W. $\frac{4}{3}$ W. and S. E. $\frac{4}{5}$ E. 130 yards. Fixed Red Lights, visible 7 miles. In one they lead clear to the Southwestward of the Beacon Rock.

ARBROATH, on Northern Pier. Fixed Red Light, visible 8 miles, when vessels are about to enter. An Occasional White Flash is a warning to keep off.

MONTROSE, N. side of the entrance (2), bearing N.W. by W. & W. and S.E. by E. & E. 303 yards. Fixed Red Lights, visible 10 and 11 miles. When in one they lead into the river and clear the Annat Bank.

MONTROSENESS. Fixed White Light. Visible 17 miles.

GIRDLENESS, on the Ness; (2) vertical, in same Tower. Fixed, visible 19 and 16 miles. Fog Steam Whistle sounded at intervals of one minute, the sound to continue about ten seconds each time, and be repeated day and night while the fog lasts.

ABERDEEN, on the North Pier Head. Fixed, and visible 8 miles, from half flood till high water.

Abod till high water. ABERDEEN, half a mile up the Harbour, on South Shore (2), bearing W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S, and E, $\frac{3}{4}$ N, 220 yards. Fixed, and visible 3 miles. These lights are Red when entrance is sate, but Green when ships cannot enter. When in line they bear W. oy S. southerly.

BUCHANNESS, or Boddom Point, on the Ness. Flashes every 5 seconds, visible 16 miles.

PETERHEAD, S. Harbour, elbow of W. Pier. Fixed, visible 10 miles, shown between bearings of N. by W. round northerly to N.E. by E. J. E. PETERHEAD, N. Harbour, West Pier.

PETERHEAD, N. Harbour, West Pier. Fixed Red Light, visible 10 miles. Seen between the bearings of S.W. $\frac{1}{3}$ S. and W. $\frac{2}{3}$ S.

W. 4 S. FRASERBURGH, Pier Head and Middle Pier, 2 Fixed Red Lights bearing S.E. by E. and N.W. by W. 76 yards. Fixed, and visible 5 miles.

KINNAIRD HEAD, on the Head. Fixed Light, White and Red sectors, visible 15 miles. White between the bearings of E, by S. $\frac{3}{5}$ S, round southerly to N. W. by N.; then Red northerly as far as the land admits to indicate Ratiray Briggs Pocks.

MACDUFF, N. Pier head. Fixed light, White and Red sectors, visible 6 miles. Red when harbour is open.

BANFF, on N. Pier head. Fixed White light, visible 8 miles.

WICK, or Fulteneytown, E. Pier Head. Fixed Red Light, visible Smiles. When it is unsafe to enter the Harbour three Black Balls are shown on the look-out tower, at the south head, by day, and a Green Light by night.

Noss HEAD, on the Head. Revolves every half-minute: Bright to seaward, and Red towards Sinclair Bay. Visible 18 miles.

PENTLAND SRERRIES, on the Island. Two Fixed Lights, bearing N.N.E. and S.S.W. 33 yards, and visible 18 and 16 m. DUNNET HEAD, a fixed light, visible 23 miles.

HOLBURN HEAD, flashing every 10 seconds, white towards Pentland Firth and Thurso Bay till it bears N.N.E., but Red towards Scrabster Roads.

ORKNEY ISLANDS.

AUSKERRY, Stronsay Firth. Fixed Whi'e Light, on south end of the island, visible 16 miles.

CANTICK, on the Head, S.E. extremity of South Walls, Hoy Island. White light, revolves every minute, visible 15 miles.

Hor Souxe. The High Light stands on the N.E. point of Græmsvy Island, and the Low Light on the N.W. point, and bearing S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. and N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 2237 yards. Two Fixed Lights, visible 15 and 11 miles. The High Light is Red when seen from seaward, but White when between S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. and W.S.W.; it also lights a small are towards Cavain Scapa Flow, between N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. and N.N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. The Low Light is White, and is visible between E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. and W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. round by N. When the Lights are in one they lead between the Rocks of Bow and Kirk; when within half a mile of the shore on this line the High Light disappears below the fore-ground, then haul towards the Stromness shore when the Red Light will re-appear.

KIRKWALL, on Pier Head, fixed Red Light. Another fixed light, White, on inner harbour pier head. Visible 9 miles.

START POINT, Sanday. Fixed Red, and visible 15 miles.

NORTH RONALDSHAY. White, flashes every 10 seconds, visible 18 miles.

SUMBURGH HEAD. S.W. point of the Shethands. Fixed, visible 21 miles, from N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. to N.W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N, by the S.

BRESSAY. East side of entrance to Lerwick. Revolves every minute. Red and White alternately. Visible fifteen miles.

WHALSEY SKERRIES, Revolves every minute, visible 18 miles.

In Peril on the Cliffs: The Lost Rope. By Daniel Gorrie.

A w the west side of the Island of Westray, in the Orkneys, a wild wall of cliffs faces the Atlantic, and the shelves of these cliffs are the favourite haunt of Kitiwake gulls, puffins, cormorants, and other varieties of sea-fowl. Some years ago, when the islanders could place less dependence than they do now upon the product of their agricultural industry, they showed skill and daring in gathering the sea-fowls' eggs that were deposited in large numbers on the shelves of the rocks, and also in capturing the birds themselves by ingenious contrivances in the form of nets. Their occupation being as daugerous as that of the samphire-gatherers mentioned by Shakespeare in *King Loar*, the egg-gatherers sometimes had a rope round their waists which was fastened at the top of the cliffs; but frequently, like Thomas Edward, the now famous Scotch naturalist, they trusted for security to their own coolness of head and dexterity in the use of their hands and feet. THEEE died not long ago, in one of these islands, a singular character, who might have sat for the portrait of Norma of Fitful Head; though the web of mystery and sorrow which the "Great Magician" interwove with the history of the latter, is here wanting.

Suneva Renton laid claim to the character of a "wise woman," skilled in medicine and occult science; but especially to the gifts said to be conferred by "Fairy Folk." A midwife by profession, she possessed the reputation of undoubted, unfailing skill, exercised, however, too often with-out the least spark of human sympathies or kindliness. Self-reliance and decision she displayed in abundance, and her experience was unquestionable; and by these she acquired among her country-women, and country-men too, if truth must be told, a very singular degree of influence, so that she was consulted till her death, in all sorts of mysterious diseases, or what to the common people appeared such, and that in animals as well as in human beings. But these applications to the "wise woman" were carefully concealed whenever it was possible; and it was a laughable circumstance, that as her nearest neighbour was the minister, whom she considered her worst enemy, persons from distant islands who came to seek her assistance, on inquiring the way to her residence, asked, to deceive the informant, for the Manse, which they as invariably passed to go to the next cottage.

Mother Suneva's knowledge of herbs and simples was extensive, and her applications of them were correct and judicious, which, no doubt, contributed much to her success and reputation; but her charms and incantations were at least as often in request, and more firmly relied on. With little of the "milk of human kindness" in her bosom, she ruled her large family, and even hr rusband, with a rod of iron, and was by them respected and obeyed, with an alacrity and zeal, rarely witnessed in Shetland families of their class, where parental love is exemplary, but filial duty too little cultivated.

The following is our heroine's own account of some of her interviews with the "wise people," and the gifts she re-ceived from them. She was sitting alone, on a calm, hazy, summer's day, when a man extremely good-looking, and about thirty years of age, came in, and said, "A woman required her services im-mediately." She got up and followed him, as soon as she had thrown her shawl around her. She then asked who the person was to whom she was going, but he replied, she would soon see that. In what appeared a very brief space of time, she came to a place she had never seen, and wondered much how such a house had arisen, so near her own residence, without her knowledge. When she entered the house, which was much superior to those she was accustomed to, she met a cousin of her own, whom to be dead, and seen for years, but believed to be dead, and she used the common exclamation, "Gade be near us! 

795-First appearance of the Norse Vikings in the Western Seas. They plunder the Isle of Rachrin.

798-Invasion of the Isle of Man by the Norsemen, Inispatrick burned.

802-I Columbkil burned by the Norsemen.

806-I Columbkil again plundered by the Norsemen, and sixty-eight men of the monastery slain.

807-First invasion of the mainland of Ireland by the Norsemen.

815-Turgesius (Thorkel ?), chief of the invading Northmen, establishes himself as king of the foreigners in Ireland, making Armagh the capital of the kingdom.

824-Bangor, in the north of Ireland, the seat of the monastery of St Comhgall, burned, and the bishop and clergy slain by the Northmen.

843-Union of the Picts and Scots under Kenneth M'Alpin, founder of the Scottish dynasty.

853-Arrival of Olaf the White in Ire-He seizes Dublin, establishes land. himself there as king, makes an expedi-tion to Scotland, and besieges and takes Dumbarton.

872-Harald Harfagri becomes sole King of Norway; makes an excedition against the western Vikings, who have established their viking station in Orkney, drives them from their haunts, and subdues Shetland, Orkney, the Hebrides, and Man. He gives Orkney and Shetland, as an earldom of Norway, to Rognvald, Earl of Mceri, father of Hrolf (Rollo), the conqueror of Normandy.

875-Earl Sigurd Eysteinson, who had received the earldom of Orkney from his brother Rognvald, Earl of Mœri, forms an alliance with Thorstein the Red, son of Olaf the White, King of Dublin. Thev invade the northern mainland of Scotland, and subdue Caithness and Sutherland as far as Ekkialsbakki. Thorstein the Red is shortly afterwards killed in Caithness; and Earl Sigurd dies, and is buried under a cairn at Ekkialsbakki.

893-Einar (Torf Einar) slays Halfdan Halegg, one of the sons of Harald Harfagri, and buries him under a cairn in North Ronaldsay.

933-Death of Harald Harfagri. Eirik Bloodyaxe, his son, becomes King of Norway. About this time the name "Scotia" and "Scotland," previously applied to Ireland. is first given to North Britain, which had formerly been called Caledonia, Pictavia, or Alban.

950-Fall of King Eirik Bloodyaxe, and of Arnkell and Erlend, sons of Torf Einar, and Earls of Orkney. in battle in England.

963-Thorfinn Hausakliuf Earl of Ork-ney. The sons of Eirik Bloodyaxe arrive in Orkney.

980-Sigurd Hlodverson becomes Earl

of Orkney. 986-I Columbkill plundered by the Norsemen, and the abbot and fifteen of the clerics slain.

992-Olaf Tryggvi's son, while on a roving expedition, is baptised by a hermit

in the Scilly Isles. 995-Olaf Tryggvi's son becomes King of Norway, and immediately establishes Christianity by the strong hand. Returning from a western cruise, on his way to Norway he finds Earl Sigard Hlodverson by chance at Osmondwall in the Orkneys, and obliges him to pro-fess Christianity, and to promise to establish the true faith in the Orkneys.

1000-Fall of King Olaf Tryggvi's son at the battle of Swalder in Norway.

1014-Buttle of Clontarf, near Dublin, in which Sigurd Hlodverson, Earl of Ork-ney, fell. Thorfinn, his son, is made Earl of Caithness and Sutherland by Malcolm II., K. of Soots, his maternal grandfather.

1015-Olaf Haraldson (afterwards St Olaf) becomes King of Norway.

1918-Battle of Ulfreksfiord, in which Eur! Einar is vanquished by Eyvind Urarhorn and King Conchobhar.

1019-Einar (Wrymouth), Earl of Orkney. slain by Thorkel Fostri at Sandwick, in Deerness, Orkney. 1020-The Earls Thorfinn and Brusi

acknowledge the suzerainty of King Olaf the Holy over the Orkneys.

1023-Olaf the Holy driven from Norway by Canute the Great, King of England and Denmark.

1030-Fall of King Olaf the Holy at the battle of Stiklestad.

1034—Death of Malcolm II., King of Scots. According to the Saga, "Kali Hundsson takes the kingdom," and, Duncan I. succeeds to the throne in Scotland. Mission of Einar Thambarskelfir and Kalf Arneson to Russia to offer their aid to Magnus, son of King Olaf the Holy, to obtain the throne of Norway.

1035-Magnus the Good, son of Olaf Haraldson (the Holy), succeeds to the throne of Norway, and Rognvald Brusi-

1039—Duncan I., King of Scots, slain by Macbeth, who becomes king.

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1047-Magnus the Good dies in Denmark, and is succeeded by Harald Sigurdson, surnamed Hardradi.

1050-Einar Thambarskelfir and the sons of Endridi slain in Norway by Harald Hardradi.

1054—Macbeth defeated by Malcolm (Canmore), son of Duncan.

1057-Malcolm Canmore crowned at Scone.

1034—Death of Thorfinn Sigurdson, Earl of Caithness and Orkney. He is succeeded by his sons Paul and Erlend, and his widow, Ingibiorg (according to the Saga) is married to Maleolun Canmore.

1066—Fall of King Harald Sigurdson (Hadradi) at the Stamford Bridge, near York, in which Harald Godwinson was victor. His son Olaf (Kyrre) and the Orkney Earls, Paul and Erlend, who were with him in the battle, receive peace from the conqueror, and liberty to return to Orkney. Olaf Kyrre succeeds to the throne of Norway.

1067—Malcolm Canmore marries Margaret, sister of Edgar Atheling.

1093-Malcohn Canmore killed at Ahwick. Death of King Olaf Kyrre, and accession of Magnus Barelegs to the throne of Norway. He makes an expedition to the west, ruvages the Scottish coasts, and assists Muirceartach in the capture of Dublin.

1098-King Magnus makes a second expedition to the west, seizes the Earls of Orkney, Paul and Erlend, and sends them both to Norway (where they died); places his own son, Sigurd, over the Orkneys; and overruns the Hebrides, Kintyre, and Man.

Makeys; and Man. 1103-Magnus, King of Norway, slain in Ireland. His son, Sigurd, goes from Orkney to Norway, and succeeds to the kingdom jointly with his brothers Eystein and Olaf. Magnus Erlendson (St Magnus), and Hakon, Paul's son, succeed to the earldom of Orkney.

1106-Accession of Ålexander I., to the throne of Scotland.

107-King Sigurd (Magnusson) sets out on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, which occupies him for three years. He is henceforth called Sigurd, the Jorsalafarer.

• 1115-Magnus Erlendson (St Magnus) slain in Egilshay by his cousin Hakon, Paul's son.

1124—Death of Alexander I., and accession of David I., King of Scots.

1130-Death of King Sigurd, the Jorsala farer, and accession to the throue of Norway of King Harald Gilli, an illegitimate son of King Magnus Barelegs, from the Hebrides.

1136-Harald Gilli slain by Sigurd Slembidiakn. Rognvald (Kali) Kolson

obtains the earldom of Orkney from Earl Pall, son of Hakon, who is carried off to Athole by Swein Asleifson.

1139-Death of Sigurd Slembidiakn. Visit of Bishop John of Athole to Orkney. Harald Maddadson, son of Maddad, Earl of Athole, shares the earldom of Caithness and Orkney with Earl Rognvald (Kali).

1151—Earl Kognvald and Erling Skakki leave Norway to prepare for their pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The Jorsalafarers winter in Orkney.

1152—Earl Rogurald leaves the Orkneys on his pilgrimage to Jerusalem. King Eystein comes to Orkney from Norway, and seizing Earl Harald Maddadson at Thurso obtains from him an acknowledgment of his suzerainty over the Orkneys.

1153—Death of David I., King of Scotland, and accession of Malcolm the Maiden.

1155 — Earl Rognvald returns from Palestine. Erlend Ungi receives Rognvald's mother, Margaret, in marriage, and is shortly afterwards slain by the Earls Rognvald and Harald.

1158—Earl Rognvald slain at Calder in Caithness by Thorbiorn Klerk. Earl Harald becomes sole ruler of Caithness and Orkney.

1165—Malcolm the Maiden dies at Jedburgh, and is succeeded by King William the Lion.

1168—Death of William the Old, first Bishop of Orkney.

1176-Magnue Erlingson becomes King of Norway. Harald Ungi (son of Eirik Slagbrellir by a daughter of Earl Rognvald) receives from King Magnus the title of Earl and half of the Orkneys, and from King William the Lion half of Caithness, and is subsequently defeated and slain in Caithness by Earl Harald Maddadson.

1194—Magnus Erlingson, King of Norway, slain by King Sverrir, who succeeds him.

1188—Death of William II., Bishop of Orkney.

1192—Canonisation of Rognvald (Kali), Earl of Orkney, who was killed by Thorbiorn Klerk.

1194-The Eyjarskeggiar collect forces in Orkney, and attempt to place Sigurd, son of Magnus Erlingson, on the throne of Norway, but are defeated, and nearly all slain, by King Sverrir, at Floravogr, near Bergen.

195-Earl Harald Maddadson, compromised by his expedition, goes to Norway with Bishop Bjarni, lays his head at the king's feet, saying that he is now an old man, and entirely in the king's power. He is pardoned by King Sverrir, but on condition of forfeiting to the crown of Norway the whole of Shetland, which does not again form part of the domain of the Norwegian Earls of Orkney till 1379.

1202 King William the Lion marches north to Eysteinsdal on the borders of Caithness, with a great army, to take revenge for the mutilation of Bishop John, and the expulsion of the deputies of Rognvald Gadrodson from Caithness by Earl Harald. Harald purchases peace by a payment of 2000 merks.

1206 - Death of Earl Harald Maddadson. He is succeeded by his surviving sons, John and David. Thorfinn, his eldest son, diel in Roxburgh Castle, where he was confinel as a hostage, and had been mutilated by King William the Lion.

1214-Death of King William the Lion, and accession of Alexander II. to the throue of Scotland. Death of David, son of Harald Maldadson. His surviving brother John becomes sole Earl of Orkney and Caithness.

1222-Burning of Bishop Adam at Halkirk in Caithness, by the enraged peasan-try. The King of Scots caused the hands and feet to be hewel from a number of those who were present at the burning, and many of them died in consequence.

1223 -- Death of Bishop Bjarai, and consecration of Jofreyr to the see of the Orkneys.

1231 - Earl John slain at Thurso. The line of the ancient Norwegian Earls of Orkney having become extinct by his death, King Alexander II. creates Magnus, son of Gilbride, Earl of Augus, Earl of Caithness, and separating Satherland into another earldom, gives it to William, son of Hugh Freskyn.

1239-Death of Magnus, Earl of Caithness and Or mey

1243-Death of Gilbert, Bis. of Caithness. 1247-Death of Jofreyr, Bis. of Orkney.

1249-Death of Alexander II., King of Scots, at Kerrera, Argyllshire. 1256—Death of Gilbride II., Earl of

Orkney.

1263-Expedition of King Hakon Hakonson, of Norway, to Scotland; he is defeated at Largs, and dies at Kirkwall.

1266-Cession of the He rides and Man to Scotland by treaty between Magnus IV., King of Norway, and Alexander III., King of Scotland.

1273-Death of Magnus, son of Gilbride, Earl of Orkney.

1276-Magnus, son of Magnus, made Earl of Orkney by King Magnus Hakonson, at Tunsherg.

1281 -Marriage of King Eirik Magnusson to Margaret, daughter of King Alexander II. of Scotland.

1283—Death of Marg., Queen of Norway. 1284—Margaret, infant daughter of Eirik, King of Norway, recognised as heiress to the Scottish throne. Death of Magnus Magnusson, Earl of Orkney.

1236-Death of King Alexander III, of Scotland.

1289-Betrothal of the Princess Mararet, the Maiden of Norway, to Prince Edward of England.

1290-Death of Margaret, the Maiden of Norway, off the coast of Orkney, on her way to Scotland. 1293-Marriage of King Eirik Magnus-

son, of Norway, to Isabella, daughter of Robert Bruce, Earl of Carrick.

1300 - Appearance at Bergen of the false Margaret, a German woman who gave herself up as the "Maiden of Norway," daughter of King Eirik and Qucen Margaret, stating that she had been "sold" by Ingibiorg Erlingsdatter, and spirited away by parties who had an interest in her disappearance.

1301-The false Margaret is burnt as an impostor at Nordness, in Bergen, and her husbaud beheaded.

1°10 -Death of John, Earl of Orkney.

1312-Treaty of Perth (1266) renewed at inverness.

1"14-Battle of Bannockburn,

1333-Battle of Halidon Hill. Death of Malise, Earl of Stratherne.

1334-Forleiture of the earldom of Stratherne, and marriage of Isabella, daughter of Malise, Earl of Stratherne, Caithness, and Orkney, to William, Earl

of Ross. Malise goes to Norway. 1353-Erngisl Suneson, son-in-law of Malise, Earl of Stratherne, made Earl of Orkney.

1375-King Hakon grants the earldom of Orkney for one year to Alexander de Ard, who resigns all his lands in Caithness to King Robert II.

Here are no Seceders nor Dissenters of any kind.—Three suicides have been committed within these few years: One by a young woman, after a long fit of deep melancholy, from what cause is not known; another by an elderly woman, during a lowness of spirits, occasioned by a lingering fever; and the third by a young man, in the height of a nervous fever. Hanging was the death those unfortunate persons made choice of.

The advantages of this parish are fire, water, and fine women ; notwithstanding which, most of the heritors reside at a distance, and leave their tenants to the mercy of factors, and under agents, who, besides the services payable to their masters, require many others, under the denomination of favours, which, like Harry VIII.'s benevolences, they dare not refuse. But it is to be hoped, that Mr Honyman of Græmsay, whose mind is enlightened by southern ideas, will redress those grievances, will abolish personal services, will grant long leases to his tenants, and encourage them to improve their farms; whereby he will render his people happy, his family re-spected, and gain to himself immortal honour; whilst his conduct, at the same time, will be an example to others, which they will be proud to imitate.

In the churchyard are the remains of an ancient building, called the Girthhouse, to which great antiquity is ascribed. It is a rotundo of 18 feet in diameter, and 20 feet high; open at top; and on the east side is a vaulted concavity, where probably the altar stood, with a slit in the wall to admit the light; two-thirds of it have been taken down to repair the parish church. The walls are thick, and consist of stones, strongly cemented with lime. From its resemblance to the Pantheon, some have ascribed this building to the Romans; hut, probably, it has been a Popish chapel, dedicated to some favourite saint.

Cup Divination and Pyromancy in Shetland.

tr was a maxim with the nations of antiquity, that if there are gods, they core tor men, and if they care for men they must be desirous to impart a knowledge of future events, because, by this menns, man would know how to obtain the good and aroid the evil, but the great difficulty lay in the question, how to find suitable vehicles of communication by which the gods might be propitiated to vouchsafe to men this needed knowledge.

The ancient Chaldeans sought in the starry heavens to know the fate of nations and of individuals; and the middle ages, for the same purpose, looked in Auguries and Auspices.

There was Axinomancy, the art of discovering the perpetration of a crime, by poising an axe on the top of a pole, and judging of guilt or innocence by the direction in which it fell. Belomancy. Bibliomancy, shooting with arrows. opening the Bible and observing the first pissage which occurred. Botanomancy, divination by plants and flowers. Capnomancy, divination by smoke. Cheiromancy, reading the lineaments of the hand. Cosinomancy, divination by using a sieve and pair of shears. Crystallomancy, divination by crystals or precious stones. Cup divination, cup reading. Geomancy, divination by pebbles. Hydromancy, divination by pebbles. divination by water, or by a mirror. Lithomancy, divination by stones. Oneiromancy, divination by dreams. Pyromancy, divination by fire. Rabdomancy, divination by the divining rod, &c. A strange list of delusions, indeed, we may now say; and equally strange it is that so many of them have come down to our own day, it being within the author's memory when Bibliomancy, Cheiromancy, Botanomancy, Cosinomancy, Cup divination, Oneiromancy, and Pyromancy were all practised in the Shetland Islands, at least to such an extent as renders it easy to identify each particular superstition with its more elaborate prototype.

Cup divination by the ancients was a more aristocratic performance than its more indern disciples could attain to. The former placed precious stones, with inscriptions on them, upon gold leaf, and dropped them into water contained in a glass cup, and read the signs on its surface, while the latter used a stoneware cup and a few tea grounds, forming pictures by the fortuitous arrangement of stalks and broken leaf. The author

has often had these pointed out and explained to him by an expert; and by a little help of the imagination, wonderful pictures they make of things both animate and inanimate. In foretelling events by the aid of those pictures, the order of time is reckoned from the trim of the cup downwards, the lrim being the present, the bottom the distant future, and the scale being days, months, or years, according as the nature of the case requires. The author is bound to say that he has known many wonderful predictions by cup diviners followed by as wonderful fulfilments.

DYROMANCY, or divination by fire was common amongst the Greeks and Romans.

In offering sacrifices to the gods, the manner in which the victim was consumed was held to prognosticate good or evil. If the sacrifice burned clear of smoke and did not crackle, the omen was favourable, but otherwise it was not.

In Shetlaud, pyromancy was closely allied to cup reading-half consumed brands taking the place of tea grounds. When a peat fire is nearly consumed some of the brands often remain standing in an upright position in the light white ashes by which they are surrounded. And it was the fancied resemblance which those brands bore to persons, animals, ships, &c., which furnished the fire reader with the means of forstelling events. One solitary upright brand, resembling a man or woman, was always called a 'guest,''.e., a stranger or visitor from a distance. If it could be guessed who the person might be, and if welcome, the brand was lifted in the tomes and placed in the centre of the fire, and other brands heaped upon as an intruder, the brand was dipped in a tub of water, so that the individual represented might get a drenching of rain if he or she attempted the journer,

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THESE directions are issued in the belief that many persons suffer from serious and troublesome complaints, in consequence of neglecting slight ailments that might readily be removed by adopting the following simple remedies.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

The dose, for an adult, is two pilules, or one or two drops of tincture in a dessert-spoonful of water. Forchildren, a mixture should be made of two drops, or four pilules, in a table-spoonful of water; a teaspoonful of the mixture to be given to a child from 3 to 10 years of age, and half a tea-spoonful to an infaut.

The frequency of repeating the medicine must entirely depend upon the nature of the complaint; if it be of long standing, twice to three times a day is sufficient, but if recent, at intervals of one to four hours, according to the severity of the symptoms.

COUGH

Should never be neglected, as it often terminates in some more serious and complicated complaint.

Cough. — Hard, dry, tickling in the throat. — Aconite and Bryonia, alternately every two hours.

Cough.—Convulsive, hard, dry, worse at night, with sore throat.—Belladonna in alternation with Merc. Sol. every two hours.

Cough.-Moist, arising from exposure to wet.-Dulcamara, a dose four times daily.

Cough.-With Indigestion.-NuvVomica and Pulsatilla in alternation every three hours.

Cough.-With hoarseness, loss of voice, consumptive coughs.- Phosphorus and Kali Bichromas, time about every three hours.

Cough.—In children.—Chamomilla and Cina alternately every three hours.

Cough.-Whooping. Drosera, Spongia, and Ipecacumha, in alternation. See Buddock's Vade Mecum. Cough.-Whooping, threatening suffo-

Cough.-Whooping, threatening suffocation.-Ipecacuanha, every hour and a half.

COLD IN THE HEAD.

Cold in the Head.-As soon as any chilli- in the throat.

ness is felt, a few doses of the Concentrated Solution of Camphor, taken at intervals of half an hour, will frequently terminate it.

Cold in the Head, with feverish symptoms, chills followed by heats.—Aconitum, a dose every half hour.

Cold in the Head, with copious thin discharge, excertation of the parts, loss of strength.—Arsenicum and Kali Bichromas, in alternation every hour.

Cold in the Head, with frequent sneezing, discharge from the nose, perspiration.— Mercurus in alternation with Pulsatilla.

Cold in the Head, with loss of taste and smell, offensive discharge from the nose. —Pulsatilla alternately with Kali Bichromas every two hours.

Cold in the Head, with stuffing in the head, headache.—Nux Vomica and Belladonna alternately every half hour. Cold in the Head from exposure to wet.

Cold in the Head from exposure to wet. —Dulcamara and Gelseminum alternately every hour and a half.

SORE THROAT.

Sore Throat, with dryness and redness, difficulty of swallowing.—Belladonna and Merc. Sol. in alternation every hour.

Sore Throat.—Clergyman's—China and Hepar Sulph. time about every three hours.

Sore Throat, with flow of saliva, swollen or ulcerated tonsils. — Mcrcurius and Arsenicum alternately every hour.

Sore Threat, with feverishness, thirst, heat, pricking in the threat.—Aconitum and Phytolacca in alternation every half hour.

Sore Throat, with hoarseness.—Hepar Sulph. and Spongia in alternation every two hours.

Sore Throat.—Chronic.—Carbo Veg. and Arsenicum in alternation every four hours.

Sore Throat.—Putrid, with great prostration of strength.—Arsenicum and Iodium in alternation every hour.

NOTE.—Apply a cold-water bandage to the throat, covered with oiled silk, at bed time, and keep it on until the morning. Then sluice the throat with Condy's Fluid and Water. The inhalation of steam will frequently give relief to pain in the throat.

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HEADACHE.

Headache, with fullness, pressure, and heaviness on the forehead and over the eye balls, throbbing in the temples ; also when increased by light and noise .-Belladonna and Merc. Sol. in alternation every hour.

Headache, with pains on one side of the head, worse on movement, constipation, rheumatic headache .- Bryonia and Gelseminum alternately every hour.

Headache, with disordered digestion, giddiness, pain over the eyes, either when caused by sedentary habits, or stimulants.-Nux Vomica and Sulphur alternately every two hours.

Headache, with vomiting of food and bilious matter.-Ipecacuanha and Pulsatilla alternately every half hour.

Headache, from eating rich food, nausea or vomiting, heaviness in the head.— Pulsatilla and Carbo Vcg. time about every hour

Headache, violent stupefying, compressive pains.-Gelseminum in alternation with Opium every hour.

Headache, nervous, one sided, with pain as if a nail were driven into the head.-Ignatia and Arsenicum time about every hour.

CONFINED BOWELS.

Constipation, with indigestion, headache, ineffectual straining, tendency to piles from sedentary life, or abuse of intoxicat-ing liquors.-Nux Vomica and Lycopodium time about every two hours.

Constipation, with disordered stomach. headache, especially in summer, and in persons subject to rheumatism.-Bryonia and Pulsatilla time about every hour.

Constipation, with drowsiness, oppressive headache, and in aged persons .- Opium and Coffea in alternation four times daily.

Constipation, habitual, with tendency to piles .- Nux Vomica and Sulphur in alternation every three hours.

Constipation, obstinate. - Lycopodium and Æsculus Hippo. time about every four hours.

Constipation, with colic, and tendency to paralysis .- Plumbum and Belladonna time about every two hours.

NOTE.-Drink a tumbler of cold water every morning on rising; take daily exercise, light and digestible food ; fruits and vegetables in moderation; brown bread may also be used with advantage.

DIARRHŒA.

food, unripe fruit, atmospheric changes.

Diarrhea.-At the outset, with shivering. coldness, cramps.-Concentrated Solution of Camphor ten drops every quarter of an hour.

Diarrhea, with griping, straining, straining straining, Mercurius and Pulsatilla time about every hour and a half.

Diarrhea, with bilious vomiting. — Bryonia in alternation with Mercurius Sol. every half hour.

Diarrhea, in the summer .- Bryonia and Arsenicum every hour.

Diarrhea, with watervor slimy motions. especially in children.-Chamomilla and Arsenicum every half hour.

Diarrhea, with heat internally, coldness of the body, great prostration.—Arseni-cum and Gelseminum ever quarter of an hour alternately.

Diarrhea, from indigestion, pastry, or rich food .- Pulsatilla every hour.

Diarrhea, from cold, especially in the summer or autumn.-Dulcamara and Gelseminum time about every half hour.

Diarrhea, with cutting, griping pains, cramps.-Veratrum and Colocynth every quarter of an hour alternately.

INDIGESTION.

SYMPTOMS .- Fullness and pressure n the stomach, sour risings, nausea or vomiting, headache, flatulence, impaired appetite.

Indigestion, with pressure in the stomach, bitter risings, costiveness, or tendency to piles : either from sedentary habits or excess in eating and drinking. -Nux Vomica and Podophyllin time about every two hours.

Indigestion, with aversion to food, costiveness, irritable temper, in bilious or rheumatic persons, in summer or damp weather.-Bryonia and Dulcamara time about every three hours.

Indigestion, in women, or in persons of a mild disposition, either caused by eating rich food, or by diarrhœa.-Pulsatilla and Carbo Veg. time about every two hours.


Indigestion, with unpleasant taste in the morning, desire for cool things.-Mer-curius Sol. and Arsenicum time about every two hours.

Indigestion, with sickness.-Ipecacuanha every hour.
